








Mission





Disability Decorum Trainings

- We hosted 8 Disability Decorum Trainings.
- 2 of our trainings were open to the public and hosted via Zoom.
- 6 of our trainings were hosted by private entities for staff professional development.

Accessibility Reviews

- We provided 11 Accessibility Reviews to educate entities on the barriers present in their facilities.
- We provided design reviews and letters of support for 4 grant projects to increase accessibility.

This year, we've dedicated 5,806 hours to community and systems advocacy, collaboration, equal access, and community education.

respectfully interacting with people with disabilities,


Inclusion, Ableism, and gives an introduction to Centers for

Disability Network West Michigan staff had the opportunity to work with Visit Muskegon and the Michigan Department of Natural Resources to promote the use of the Action Track Chair that is available via reservation, for free, and can be used at Muskegon State Park beach or the Muskegon Luge Adventure Sports Park. In our service region, there are also Action Track Chairs available at Ludington State Park as well as many other Michigan State Parks.

Parties In The Park

In 2022, Disability Network West Michigan was fortunate enough to be selected to host a Party in the Park, at Hackley Park in Downtown Muskegon. This awesome community event is a fundraiser for the hosting nonprofit organizations and allowed DNWM to raise some unrestricted funds to direct towards expenses and programs that lack grant support. Our party featured local bands Flexadecibel and Aaron Benjamin, and we put some extra focus on being inclusive by having American Sign Language Interpreters, an accessible seating area, and a sensory-friendly pop up tent for people to cool off or get away from the hustle and bustle of the event.

Success Stories

Making a Connection

A 22-year-old who is legally blind, due to a brain aneurysm at the age of 20, came to Disability Network West Michigan and wanted an Independent Living Plan. In this plan, she wanted to connect with the Bureau of Services for Blind Persons (BSBP) to start learning to do things on her own, including taking care of her toddler, using a cell phone, walking on her own, and so much more. Her plan also included applying for Social Security Disability as a source of income because she is currently homeless and wants to find housing. This consumer has been having a difficult time connecting with BSBP due to not having a permanent residence or cell phone number. Once she knew she'd be working with the Bureau of Services for Blind Persons, DNWM was able to provide a space for her and the BSBP representative to meet in person. DNWM also assisted with reminder text messages for her, but she has mostly stayed on top of her responsibilities on her own, by keeping in contact with DNWM staff. Through these efforts, she was able to connect BSBP, and will start her program April 3rd, 2023.

Success Stories

Transportation Program

Story #1

The transportation program has really helped me get out and about more. It has particularly helped with my anxiety and social isolation. I am becoming more comfortable with driving, and little by little, I am able to drive farther. I typically don't drive very far, but it does help me be more independent. It's so nice to get out and go where I need to go. This past week I was able to go to the dentist, which is the farthest I have driven."

Story #2

"We are very appreciative of the transportation program. We typically go to Rockford, which opens the door to being involved in volunteer opportunities or therapeutic horseback riding. I wish there was public transportation in Newaygo County but right now there is not, so this program helps my daughter be able to get out, engage in the community, and do things that she enjoys a little bit more or therapeutic horseback riding. 






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
